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FACT SHEET (FY 2016-17)

The Sonoma County Area Agency on Aging (AAA) was established in 1980 by the California Department of Aging. The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors serves as the Board of Directors of the Area Agency on Aging. In July 1994, the AAA became a program of the Sonoma County Human Services Department's Adult & Aging Division. The division consolidates the AAA, Adult Protective Services (APS), In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS), Linkages, Multipurpose Senior Services Program (MSSP), Public Administrator/Public Guardian/Public Conservator (PA/PC), IHSS Public Authority (PA), and the Veterans Service Office in one location to better serve the community.

1. The mission of the Area Agency on Aging is to provide leadership, services, and advocacy to promote the dignity, independence, and quality of life for seniors, adults with disabilities and their caregivers.
2. The AAA receives and distributes federal, state and county monies for services that help seniors and people with disabilities remain in the community in their own homes. Funding from the California Department on Aging for community contracts and direct service programs for FY 2016-17 is shown below and represents a portion of the funding for these services.

Sonoma County Human Services Department funds an additional \$320,000 for Senior Nutrition programs to Council on Aging (\$261,000), Petaluma People Services Center (\$39,000), and West County Community Services (\$20,000). The Board of Supervisors funds an additional \$100,000 in legal services outreach through Legal Aid of Sonoma County.
4. In 2014, AAA was awarded \$89,572 from the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and in 2015, AAA was awarded \$388,975 from the Federal Transportation Authority through Caltrans to fund the implementation of mobility management activities to coordinate and enhance existing community transportation options throughout Sonoma County.
5. In FY 14/15 AAA was awarded SNAP-Ed grant funding (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program-Education) designed to facilitate the adoption of healthy food and physical activity choices to enhance health and well-being of low-income eligible individuals. The funding has continued each fiscal year. In FY16/17, AAA received \$26,630 in SNAP-Ed grant funding.
6. Sonoma County's population of seniors is projected to grow from the year 2015 figure of 125,109 to 161,001 (23% of total population) by the year 2030. Seniors currently comprise 24%, or 125,109 members of the county's population.
7. The AAA has a 21-member Advisory Council that advises the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors on issues and concerns affecting seniors, adults with disabilities and their caregivers in Sonoma County. Members of the Advisory Council are appointed to represent geographic areas of the county or to represent special population groups. 10 members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and 11 are elected by the Advisory Council. 8. The responsibilities of the Advisory Council include planning, funding, advocacy, program development, and coordination of existing services. The work plan of the Advisory Council is developed through the Area Plan. This plan addresses issues affecting community-based, long-term care system development, ensuring easy access to services, affordable transportation, housing, accessible health care, caregiver support, services to special populations, and elder abuse prevention. The work of the Advisory Council is carried out through subcommittees; these include Executive, Planning & Funding, Legislative, and Transportation & Mobility. Special projects include Fall Prevention, Elder Justice Coalition, Housing, SNAP-Ed, and Older Americans' Month, and Advance Health Care Directives.

9. The Area Agency on Aging is also responsible for the operation of the Multipurpose Senior Services Program (MSSP) and Linkages Program in Sonoma County. MSSP is a case management program for low-income, frail, elderly persons at risk of going to a nursing home. Linkages serves older adults with short term care management needs with a focus on reducing depression and elder abuse prevention.
